ANIMAL CARE

One of three areas of focus in our mission to advance global ocean conservation

The Marine Mammal Center **rescues and rehabilitates** sick and injured marine mammals at our state-of-the-art veterinary facilities by engaging a dedicated workforce and a supportive community.

Highlights of our animal care impacts from October 2021 to September 2022, made possible by your support:



Celebrated the birth of the **first two confirmed Hawaiian monk seal pups born to former patients**, a powerful example of the impact of cooperative conservation efforts for this endangered species, whose population surpassed 1,500 for the first time in more than 20 years.



Protected the endangered Hawaiian monk seal by expanding our conservation efforts to Maui, as well as deploying more than 125 volunteers, many of which were trained and positioned on beaches to monitor resting seals while providing public outreach and education to local and visiting beachgoers.

Furthered solutions to protect whales from vessel collisions by deploying **Whale Safe San Francisco**, a technology-based mapping and analysis tool, in partnership with the Benioff Ocean Science Laboratory.





Increased West Coast marine mammal stranding response capacity, including converting underused space at our Sausalito site into a Dispatch Center where we received nearly **7,000 reports** of marine mammals in distress and sent responders to assess more than **1,400 animals**.



SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH

One of three areas of focus in our mission to advance global ocean conservation

The Marine Mammal Center learns from the patients in our care and contributes to scientific understanding of the changing health of our ocean, taking action to address ocean threats and save endangered species.

Highlights of our scientific research impacts from October 2021 to September 2022, made possible by your support:



Increased the field's scientific knowledge of marine mammal species and ocean health by contributing

12 scientific research papers to peer-reviewed journals and presenting scientific findings to global audiences at

7 conferences on topics such as adapting innovative laboratory and field technologies and medical techniques.



Expanded our understanding of cetacean ecology, biology and habitat use to establish baseline population information as well as characterize, respond to, and mitigate threats to population health by completing, leading or participating in 16 whale surveys, large whale entanglement response trainings, and responses to large whales.

Identified diseases and pathogens, investigated the reasons marine mammals strand, and determined how these factors are connected to ecosystem and human health through performing 287 necropsies and processing 13,460 specimens, such as blood, tissue and fur samples.




EDUCATION

Highlights of our education impacts from October 2021 to September 2022, made possible by your support:


